REPORT NEEDS UPDATING BY TRUSTEES

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2008.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £10 in the event of a winding up.

New Trustees are identified and invited to join the Board by the Chief Executive Officer and the Chair of the Board of Trustees. They are selected on the basis of their sympathy with ClientEarth's charitable objects, and their ability to further them as a Trustee.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects are the promotion of the protection of the environment for the public benefit by the use of the law, to provide legal assistance to those who otherwise do not have access thereto, to promote education on environmental rights and responsibilities and to conduct research thereon.

We will achieve these goals through lobbying, litigation and research consistent with our charitable objects under several programme areas. Example programme areas include: lessening the impact of climate change; understanding how the regulatory system can produce electricity with fewer CO2 emissions; working on protecting threatened marine resources such as threatened fish stocks and cetaceans; and working on improving access to justice in environmental matters, both in the European Court of Justice and in the legal systems of member states.

The Trustees are pleased to state that the trust has sufficient funds to meet its current and future obligations and that such reserves as it maintains are considered to be reasonable bearing in mind that the charity started its activity at the end of the year.

Achievements and performance

During the period 1 April 2007 to 31 March 2008, James Thornton working as a consultant, continued to build ClientEarth. The following was achieved

- -Completed a series of major funding proposals for foundation grants;
- -Held our second Board of Trustees meeting on 24th October 2007 in the Royal Automobile Club;
- -Received £260,975 in funds
- -Rented space in London for our UK office and set up the office, taking on a three year lease from October 2007;
- -Hired Karla Hill, an environmental lawyer with planning and environmental experience in private law and government service, to serve as the climate and energy policy staff lawyer in the London Office;
- -Hired Ed Walker, who holds a Masters degree in environmental science from Oxford University's Environmental Change Institute to serve as administrator and pa to the CEO;
- -Established a relationship with the European Climate Foundation whereby ClientEarth took the lead in the legal campaign against the building of new coal power plants in the UK (except those which capture their carbon), focusing on the Kingsnorth plant;
- -Hired Tim Malloch, a litigator with 7 years experience at Freshfields, to lead in building the case against Kingsnorth;
- -Advised Parliamentarians and NGOs on the Climate and Energy bills in the UK Parliament;
- -Developed relationships with UK based and Brussels based NGOs;
- -Rented space in Brussels and began the hiring process for our first Brussels based lawyer.

This work continued the build-out of ClientEarth, began a network of working relationships with green groups, deepened the group of foundations who support our work, put us in a good position to advise green groups, lawmakers and foundations on environmental matters, and positioned us for further growth in the second, third and fourth quarters of 2008.

Financial review

During the period ended 31 March 2008 the charity received income of £262,883 (31.03.07 £68,234).

At 31 March 2008 the charity had net assets of £123,046 (31.03.07 £42,516), £40,419 (31.03.07 £51,090) of which made up of unrestricted cash.

At 31 March 2008, Unrestricted Funds were £45,600 (31.03.07 £42,516). It is the aim of the charity to maintain sufficient available funds to enable it to operate for a period of twelve months from any date of review.

Disclosure of information to auditors

Each of the directors has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 1985.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations, legacies, Grants and other forms of voluntary income are recognised as incoming resources when received by the charity. All income is shown gross, with associated costs analysed under the relevant cost headings. Grants due in the year, but not received are recognised based on the charity's entitlement to the grant.

Gifts in kind are recognised in the accounts as a donation received and expenditure incurred. These gifts are recorded at their market value of the service or goods provided.

Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure on management and administration of the charity includes all expenditure not directly related to the charitable activity. This includes costs of the professional services which enable the charity to function.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:
